

## Covid-19 guidance February 2022

IMPORTANT – please read this information before completing this risk assessment.

This is a model Covid-19 risk assessment and **MUST be adapted to reflect the significant hazards and control measures present in your site** This is a live document and it came into place on February 24<sup>th</sup> and whilst there is no longer a legal requirement for people with Covid-19, the updated published guidance outlines measures align with the previous legal requirement to manage risk. <u>COVID-19: people with COVID-19 and their contacts - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> Specific schools guidance is outlined in the updated <u>Contingency Framework</u> and <u>Operational Guidance</u>

The control measures listed **are prompts** and will not necessarily reflect those in all establishments and you **MUST** adapt it by adding (or removing) **and outlining in detail the control measures as appropriate to your establishment.**

The public health advice via the DfE helpline will continue to the end of March 2022. However as prior to half term any mainstream schools will be directed to DCC public health to offer support. The Smart Survey (<u>smart</u> <u>survey link</u>) reporting has an additional comments section, and this is viewed by the education team, Early years teams, schools transport and the DCC public health team and so if a specific request for support is noted in this it will get the same response as calling the DfE helpline.

| You should put in place and maintain an appropriate cleaning schedule. | <ul> <li>Reduced clutter and removing difficult to clean items to make cleaning easier.</li> <li>Cleaning using standard cleaning products such as detergents and bleach, paying attention to all surfaces but especially ones that are touched frequently, such as door handles, light switches, work surfaces, remote controls and electronic devices.</li> <li>Surfaces that are frequently touched and by many people in common areas to be cleaned twice a day.</li> <li>Avoid sharing work equipment by allocating it on a personal basis or put cleaning regimes in place to clean between each user.</li> <li>Identify where you can reduce people touching surfaces, for example by leaving doors open (except fire doors) or providing contactless payment.</li> <li>Keep surfaces clear to make it easier to clean and reduce the likelihood of contaminating objects.</li> <li>Provide more bins and empty them more often.</li> <li>Toilets and communal areas to be cleaned regularly, with a process of recording – displaying cleaning schedules.</li> <li>Sanitising spray and paper towels to be provided in classrooms for use by members of staff. Staff and pupils should follow wider advice on face coverings outside of school, including on transport to and from school. (The legal requirement to wear a face covering no longer applies. However, the government suggests that you continue to wear a face covering in crowded and enclosed spaces where you may come into contact with people you do not normally meet).</li> <li>Respiratory hygiene The 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach continues to be very important.
